


From Chairman Dave

In the background the team have been working away at various projects and some of these will be mentioned elsewhere in this edition.

We have been awaiting responses from a couple of major funding sources and I'm very pleased to announce we have secured \$100,000 from them,

.. or in relative terms - one third of our overall target of \$300,000.



When you consider that halfway through the year our funds were zero, then this is an achievement we should all pause to reflect on and celebrate. It is confirmation that the community sees the value of what we are setting out to achieve with The Ashburton Fire Museum. Thomo (Alistair Thomson) has been out canvassing for funds through his network of contacts and to date has raised a considerable amount with pledges still to come in. Great effort so far Thomo!

Assistant Area Commander Steve Butler has done an audit of plant etc at the AFM and is now on the trail of the various items of plant and equipment we require to outfit our trucks and add to the display.

Ferrymead have donated an AJAX ladder to us for the ERF and have located a missing seat squab for the rear of the appliance. We sincerely appreciate the kindred spirit of this organisation and their willingness to work with us.

Peter Mac has been on the case also and details of his successful approach to a local auto restoration company are detailed elsewhere this issue.

I'd like to acknowledge the willingness of the AVFB in funding the new boiler ticket for the Steamer following a recent inspection. As we know, the Pride of Ashburton needs to see more regular action to warrant the expense and effort of obtaining a "ticket" and this actually helps keep everything freed up and in good order. We have a conservative operating policy of this machine to ensure its longevity and conservation well into the future. Bruce Hill has been appointed as mechanical custodian of this machine. Everything concerning its operation in every instance will be channelled through Bruce.

So far this season, in addition to regular operating days at The Plains, we have opened specially for several groups. These include the South Canterbury Jaguar Drivers Club, the Tinwald School (in conjunction with the railways crew), Fulton Hogan Social Club and Winchester School. Special thanks to Alan Mac, Bill Clark, Ken Peck, Karl Peterson and Andy Rattray who made this possible.

Panelcraft Ltd to restore the ERF

An approach to Duncan and Debra Ross, owners of Ashburton specialist panel shop "PANELCRAFT" has resulted in a commitment to restore the Ashburton Fire Museums ERF appliance to its original early 70's glory

Peter Mac approached the couple knowing that they were not only a highly reputable restoration company, but that they more than most know the value of the fire service following a disastrous fire at an earlier premises several years ago.

Says Debra, "We talked about this project with our team and most were enthusiastic to take the project on."

Debra and Duncan will provide premises, expertise and access paint through their suppliers, whilst the team who have put their hands up will donate their time. It will be a great collaborative effort and an opportunity for the team to leave their mark on the community in a really positive tangible way.

Concurrently, the AFM plans to source a full suite of kit to fit-out the appliance and it is intended that on completion of the restoration, the Panelcraft team will arrive and present the finished product to the Brigade and Fire Museum crew on a Wednesday night.

The ERF is scheduled to go into the workshop in the New Year.

Special report: Firefighting - a Universal Brotherhood



Local firefighter and Secretary of the Ashburton Volunteer Fire Brigade and the Ashburton Fire Museum CRAIG WAKELIN is on an extended sojourn in the USA. In much the same way as Craig became a firefighter – by approaching and meeting crews, he has used the same technique to gain an insight into the operation of the fire service in a small USA town.

He filed this report for The Siren.



I have been fortunate enough to be staying in a small town called Idyllwild in California, USA with my daughter whom is attending a Performing Arts High School here. As a current member of the Ashburton Volunteer Fire Brigade I was very keen to make contact with the Idyllwild Fire Brigade and the result of this was they invited me to spend a day with them as a "Ridealong" which I was really keen to do.


On Friday 11th December I arranged to spend the day with them which coincided with a significant snow weather event.

I arrived at 8am which is the shift change-over time. A shift consists of 4 career crew members of which at least 2 are Paramedics, and they work 2 days and nights on and then 4 off. The first job was breakfast and they discussed anything coming up for the day. Next was to check all the trucks over and so that was a great opportunity to look at the gear and the appliances. (Nothing too different to ours really). First call came in as a medical at my daughter's school! The captain was first out the door in his own ute with the ambulance next with 2 paramedics and then an appliance turned out with a driver and I. This is a normal turnout to all calls. It was decided to transport the patient to hospital. This is a 75 minute drive 1 way. I went along for the ride, so that meant there were two firefighters left in town to attend calls. If necessary, they will then look to trained volunteers to help out if required. On the way back we were stopped at a very small town that is maybe 10 mins from Idyllwild as a cover move. We sat there for maybe 25 minutes and watched the heavy snow start to fall. We then got turned out to a Rollover MVA which resulted in a mother and daughter being transported to a different hospital which was also about 75 minutes away. By then Idyllwild had about 4 inches of snow so the Captain got me to go back to town with him as they still only had the 2 staff back in town. On the way back to the station we had to stop numerous times to assist motorists who had slid off the road. We got back just as the snow stopped and the calls seemed to stop with it.

Idyllwild Fire attend about 800 emergency calls per year of which 84% are medicals, but because they all go to the calls they are busier than they look. They did say due to being a small Brigade they tend to operate slightly different to other Brigades in the USA.

The Station is full of vehicles with the main front line ones but they have also been able to keep two older ambulances and also a Pierce Fire Appliance that the volunteers can use if required. They did have a 1937 Ford Fire Appliance out in another shed that was locked up but as it was a busy day we didn't have time to unlock the shed and have a look at it.

I had a great day. The crew all were happy to, and wanted to, talk about their roles within the Brigade and they were also very interested to hear how the NZFS and also Ashburton Volunteer Fire Brigade works. It was great to feel the comradeship of a Brigade while I was a long way from home and to know that if I or my family have any issues the Fire Brothers











Funding progress for new museum extension

Applications to both the major community funding agencies have had a successful outcome recently with a grant of \$75,000 from the Ashburton Trust Charitable Foundation (Lion Foundation) and \$25,000 from the Community Trust of Mid & South Canterbury.

Along with further financial support from the Ashburton Rotary Club \$5000 and Gold contributions (5k) from Phillip Kenny Real Estate and Brendon & Michelle Price, along with other valuable individual contributions, the total is now standing around \$120,000 - more than a third of the way to our overall target and more than halfway to getting our new extension to lock-up.

Boost for fire museum growth

The Ashburton Fire Brigade's bid to extend its fire museum at The Plains, Tinwald, received a \$25,000 boost from the Community Trust of Mid and South Canterbury.

The brigade collection has been in existence for 142 years and its collection of memorabilia is expanding. The extension will better house the memorabilia and vintage fire fighting equipment.

The Ashburton Youth Cafe Charitable Trust gets \$7500 for operational costs and the Ashburton Railway and Preservation Society (new sleepers), Ashburmower) and Ashburton centre gets \$1000 towards its operational costs.

MUSEUM EXTENSION

The Ashburton Volunteer Fire Brigade proposes to extend its Ashburton Fire Museum based at the Plains Museum complex. The brigade's collection is expanding and the extension will better house and display Ashburton's rich fire brigade memorabilia and vintage fire-fighting appliances. It has received \$25,000 funding for the project from the Mid and South Canterbury community trusts.

Building Project Managers Report

Our man Jim Reed has secured the services of Chilton & Mayne to furnish all the required drawings and specs to permit stage embracing the main structure, the link with the existing building and the specialised frontage including shop facades.

Jim took advantage of an opportunistic meeting with Dave Chilton and set up a meeting to outline what we have planned.

Dave Chilton has agreed to come on board and it is estimated his companys contribution will amount to about 5-6k's worth of work.

This will place Chilton & Mayne fairly and squarely as GOLD supporters of the Ashburton Fire Museum.

Wainui to rise again?

Local funeral director Roger Paterson has a new undertaking.

In fact – it's more of a resurrection.

Roger is dead keen, along with former brigadesman John Newlands, and retired engineer Graeme McElroy to work on a new project to fill an important and long absent gap in the AVFB history – the replication of the Shand Mason, 22-man manual, Horse-drawn pump.

There is no doubt the trio have the skills to make this happen. Roger, as a relative youngster, made a beautiful job of building a horse-drawn hearse which many said could never be done. He did do it — and it has resided in the Vintage Car Museum at Tinwald for decades. John Newlands gifts as an engineer are well-known to anyone who has seen his incredible working scale model of the brigades Steamer, The Pride of Ashburton. And Graham McElroy retired from Christchurch to Ashburton where among his many accomplishments is a beautiful and faithful reproduction of a Stanley Steamer car.

So we've put these people together and hopefully the end result will be a handsome Shand Mason Manual for the Ashburton Fire Museum Collection.

John Newlands set the ball rolling by visiting a working wheelwright at Sovereign Hill, Ballarat, Australia where he confirmed new wheels could be manufactured – but they come at a fairly hefty price. These items will no-doubt be the priciest part of the project but it's just possible someone locally might step up to fund that part of the project if they are excited at what this will result in. The wheels, after all are the foundation of the whole machine and need to be great to enable the machine to take part in parades and the like.

Alistair Stevens of Barhill who has helped the brigade with the supply of Clydesdales for the Steamer in the past, is also enthusiastic about this project and has offered anything from his vast collection of horse-drawn vehicle spare parts that might be useful.

Photographs and dimensions of a similar machine housed at MOTAT is Auckland will be obtained over the holiday break and used by the team to create a new "Wainui" – the name borne by Ashburtons original manual pump.

One vital piece is already on hand – what we believe is the original makers plate from the Wainui – which was removed and attached to an old tool box that kicked around the station for years. The Siren believes it was referred to as Lionels Toolbox – in reference to long-serving AVFB motorman Lionel Solway.

The example below is housed at MOTAT in Auckland and will be a source of data to aid the Ashburton project. It is intended that the replica will be fully operational.

If we can bring this idea to a successful conclusion, a significant missing piece of the AVFB's history will be replaced. Exciting times.
