


CHAIRMANS MESSAGE:-

Since the last issue, I am pleased to report we have been able to move forward in a very positive way with the support of the wider community and this enables us to move into the final planning and construction phase in our goal to extend and upgrade The Ashburton Fire Museum at The Plains.



Following great support from the business community and local fire-fighters we have instructed **Alpine Building Ltd** to prepare the kitset ready for construction. **Stu Tarbotton Contracting Limited** will prepare the site for the concrete floor and foundation.

Chilton & Mayne Architects are continuing their excellent contribution to our project and have been busy preparing the working drawings to go to Council for consent.

Jim Reed Builders Ltd will attach the two buildings giving us a total floor area of 500 sq meters. **Adam Martin Contracting** will form the driveway linking our new extension to Main Street at The Plains. **The Finishing Company** will do the interior paint refresh job on the existing shed. **Wilsons Bulk Transport** have kindly donated a container for storage.

The final push for funds to get us to construction was made possible by two major efforts organised by Officers and members of the Ashburton Volunteer Fire Brigade. They arranged for a Businesses Evening which attracted around thirty attending and they provided their support for the project by way of cash, services and product.

The highlight of the fundraising so far has been the very successful "FIREMANS BALL" which was very well-hosted and attended by a large crowd who enjoyed a great night. With an auction included in the evening (see details elsewhere), this proved a great money-spinner and a great exercise to bring people together for our cause.

It is hoped the Building Consent will be issued early in the New Year and construction can commence.

The communities continued support will allow us to design and fit-out The Ashburton Fire Museum at The Plains to a very high standard.

Enjoy the latest edition of The SIREN, packed full of acknowledgements and information.

Lastly, again my thanks to my hard-working committee for their efforts getting us to this stage of what is a very exciting project.

A number of their crew are giving up their personal time to help on the project which will see the ERF rubbed right back and treated to a smart new coat of paint along with replacement of window rubbers and bits and pieces to enhance the finished product. Thanks at this point to Jim Reed who has accommodated the ERF on his property for some time, Rooneys Earthmoving for helping out with some temporary batteries to shift the unit, and a huge thanks goes out to the always obliging Newlands family who have a proud history with our brigade and always step up to assist. 
